UNIFORM COMPLAINT POLICY

The Capistrano Unified School District prohibits discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying in all district activities, programs, and employment against any person based on actual or perceived gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic information, sex, sexual orientation, race, ethnicity, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, pregnancy, physical or mental disability, immigration status, or any other characteristic identified in Education Code sections 200 or 220, Government Code section 11135, or Penal Code section 422.55, or based on association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics. (5 C.C.R. § 4610.) The District also ensures compliance with federal and state laws and regulations related to other programs and activities subject to the Uniform Complaint Procedures (UCP).

The District has adopted policies establishing a UCP. (See Board Policy 1312.3, and Administrative Regulation 1312.3), addressing how complaints alleging a violation of federal or state laws or regulations are filed, investigated and resolved. UCP complaints include, but are not limited to allegations of unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation and bullying; unlawful pupil fees, and LCAP violations. For a full list of programs and activities subject to the UCP see Board Policy and Administrative Regulation 1312.3. A UCP Complaint must be filed no later than one year from the date of the alleged violation.
